### Encouragement to endure from HEBREWS

Discouragement. All of us know what it is to have the wind sucked out of our sails. Dashed hopes, sickness, a rebellious teen, or the increasing sense that your trust in Jesus puts you on the outer. And when these things are severe, or ongoing, it can challenge your faith.


The original readers of Hebrews were Jewish Christians going through tough times. Possibly they were living in Rome in the early 60s A.D., suffering from state sanctioned persecution. Though they hadn't yet experienced bloodshed (12:4), things were heating up. They faced mockery, financial loss and imprisonment (10:32-35). And martyrdom seems to have been a threat.

In this context, some were beginning to "drift" (2:4). They were "giving up meeting together" (10:25) and were tempted even to "shrink back" into Judaism (10:38-39). The comfortable rites of Judaism and the fact that it was legal under Roman law, no doubt contributed to its attraction.

And so the author of Hebrews writes to encourage them (and us!) to endure. You must "not grow weary and lose heart" but are to "strengthen your feeble arms and weak knees" (12:3; 12:12). It is a fearful thing to fall away from Jesus (10:26-27). And why would you!? Because what we have in Jesus is so much better! We have the supreme King, a sure word, an ultimate rest, a sympathetic high priest, a once for all sacrifice, a secure covenant, and an unshakeable Kingdom! In Jesus we have reason to "hold our original conviction firmly to the very end" (3:14)!

### Study 10 » Seeing Something Better

**HEBREWS 11:1-40** 

STARTER
1. What is the value of a role model? Can you think of someone you have looked up to as a role model?

#### **Q** INVESTIGATE

Chapter 11 is about faith and its role in helping us keep going. Faith involves looking forward (confidence in what we hope for) and upward (assurance about what we do not see, v1) – and it pleases God (verse 6). And the writer puts flesh and bones onto faith, by giving us role models – a great list of those who, for all their imperfections, weaknesses and troubles, persevered through faith.

**READ HEBREWS 11:1-29** 

<b>2.</b> Look at verses 7-12, 17-29. Find examples of:
<b>a.</b> Faith in God to deliver though it is not yet seen
<b>b.</b> Faith that reveals values
<b>c.</b> Faith that shapes fears
<b>3.</b> Verses 13-16 describe the patriarchs – Abraham, Isaac and Jacob – and their families. How did they live a life of faith?
READ HEBREWS 11:30-40
<b>4.</b> Compare the outcomes of faith in verses 30-34, with what we see in verses 35-38. What can we learn from this?



<b>5.</b> The characters of Hebrews 11 keep us both hopeful and realistic. What is the value of this? (What happens when you have one without the other?)
<b>6.</b> What might it look like to live as a faithful pilgrim today? How will our lives be different from those of the people around us?
7. In what ways might courage be needed in the life of faith today? How does your faith help you in such circumstances?
<b>8.</b> Look back over the characters of Hebrews 11. Are there any that particularly encourage or challenge you in your own walk?
<b>9.</b> God has "planned something better for us" in Christ (v40). Can you think of a time when that truth has been particularly meaningful to you?



Pray for one another that we might look forward with confidence to our future, trusting in God who keeps his promises. And, that we might continue to live faithfully in those times when the promised blessings are still to be seen.

STARTER
1. What tends to happen when a team or club puts very little into training? Or, where they put in a great deal? Share any experiences you have had.
INVESTIGATE
READ HEBREWS 12:1-11
2. What can we learn in these verses to help us "run the race" of the Christian life?
a. v1 Throw off what?

<b>b.</b> v2 Consider who? (What did he do and why could he do that?)
c. v7 Endure with what attitude? How will this help us not to give up (v8-11)?
APPLY
<b>3.</b> What would it look like to throw off, not only sin, but even "everything that hinders"? What steps could you take in this way?
<b>4.</b> Why do you think we need to fix our eyes on Jesus if we are to endure? What difference does that make? How can we do that practically?
<b>5.</b> Can you think of when difficulties have nevertheless 'produced a harvest' or helped to train you in Jesus?

#### **Q** INVESTIGATE

#### **READ HEBREWS 12:12-17**

<b>6.</b> Make a list of all the commands in verses 12-17.
7. How is Esau an apt picture of the hollow exchange that is made by the one who gives up on Christ?
<b>8.</b> "Make every effort to live in peace with everyone and to be holy." What do you find helpful about this instruction? How does it challenge you?
<b>9.</b> How can bitterness cause trouble and defile many? What will it look like for us to work against bitterness in our own hearts and in our church community?

10. The writer to the Hebrews wants us to be looking out for others that they might keep following Christ. As a Christian community, what steps could we take to see to it that no one falls short of the grace of God?
Give thanks for our Lord Jesus who has shown us what it looks like to run the race of faith. Pray that we might endure struggles, seeing the joy and the harvest that God intends. And, that we might look out for each other, helping one another across the finish line.

<b>4.</b> There are a few dense, yet rich, phrases mentioned regarding the New Covenant's city of God. Spend some time thinking about and discussing what each of these terms mean in verses 22-24. How do they enhance and/or expand our view of God?
<b>5.</b> What does the writer wish for these people to ultimately see, know and do (See v25, 28-29)? What may "worship God acceptably with reverence and awe" mean?
<b>APPLY</b> 6. What excites or encourages you about the city of God?
